

# Pastor Davíd's Devotional Thoughts

### Thursday, March 19

Sometimes in life, I am faced with problems I don't know how to solve, decisions I don't know how to make, and obstacles I don't have the power to overcome. In the face of this crisis, we may all feel a little like that. It reminds me of an Israelite king named Jehoshaphat that we read about in the Old Testament. There were three neighboring nations coming against him in war and he was alarmed. The king decided to ask for God's help and he proclaimed a fast for his entire nation. The people came together to ask for God's help. Jehoshaphat led the nation in prayer. The last words of that prayer stand out in my mind. "We do not know what to do, but our eyes are upon you." I certainly don't have all the answers for solving this crisis but I will try to keep my eyes upon God. You can read the whole story in 2 Chronicles 20:1-30. Hope you all have a great day!

### Monday, March 23

I know that many of you have been praying passionately during these last several days for a variety of issues involving the Corona Virus crisis. Perhaps, you have prayed for family, neighbors, friends, leaders, caregivers, researchers, workers, the sick, a cure, an end to this crisis.etc. I want to say a personal "thanks" to you for your prayers. I also want to encourage you to keep praying for these people and issues. Prayer is not the <u>only</u> thing we can do but it is the <u>best</u> thing we can do. Let's also remember that we are in a marathon not a sprint. So don't quit praying.

There is a very short verse found in 1 Thessalonians 5:17. In the *Message* version of the Bible, it simply says, "Pray all the time." Some of you feel like you have been doing that in recent days. Keep it up! Don't become discouraged! Your prayers are effective. God is listening to you.

I also think we need to be reminded of what is said immediately before and after this command to "Pray all the time." These words are also taken from *The Message*. "Be cheerful no matter what … Thank God no matter what happens." God's message to us is "Keep praying but also be cheerful and be thankful!." In spite of the crisis, we can still be cheerful and be grateful for our blessings.

#### Thursday, March 26

During these last few mornings, I have had a song on my mind that brings me a lot of comfort and reassurance. Maybe, it can be helpful to you as well.

I don't know about tomorrow, I just live from day to day. I don't borrow from its sunshine, For its skies may turn to gray. I don't worry o'er the future, For I know what Jesus said, And today I'll walk beside Him, For He knows what is ahead.



I don't know about tomorrow, It may bring me poverty; But the one who feeds the sparrow, Is the one who stands by me. And the path that be my portion, May be through the flame or flood, But His presence goes before me. And I'm covered with his blood.

Many things about tomorrow, I don't seem to understand; But I know who holds tomorrow, And I know who holds my hand.

Those words were written almost 70 years ago but it almost seems like they were written for me today. Lord, please help me to remember 2 Corinthians 4:17-18. (The Message) "Even though on the outside it often looks like things are falling apart on us, on the inside, where God is making new life, not a day goes by without his unfolding grace. These hard times are small potatoes compared to the coming good times, the lavish celebration prepared for us. There's far more here than meets the eye. The things we see now are here today, gone tomorrow. But the things we can't see now will last forever."

# Pastor Davíd's Devotional Thoughts

### Monday, March 30

Whenever we are faced with bad times, we respond in different ways. Sometimes we feel sorry for ourselves and ask, "Why me?" Other times we feel angry at the situation and others and lash out with angry words. And of course there are the times we blame others for the problems and say, "You could have prevented all of this and it's your fault that we are in the shape we



are in." In the Covid 19 crisis, I have to admit I have done all those.

In an obscure passage in the Old Testament, I see at least one way I need to be responding as far as my attitude is concerned. Just before David became king of Israel, he was living in exile from his native land hiding from King Saul who was seeking to kill him. He and the 600 men who were his followers along with their families were living in a little town of Ziklag. First Samuel 30 tells us that David and his men were gone from home for three days and during their absence a neighboring group of people, the Amalekites, attacked Ziklag, captured all their families and possessions and burned down the town. When David and his men discovered what had happened, the Bible says they cried until they didn't have any strength left to cry. David and his men were feeling sorry for themselves. I understand that. We probably have all felt like that sometime in our life. After crying, the men began to get angry. They weren't just mad at the Amalekites but they were mad at David. They were so angry at their leader that they even talked about stoning him. They began pointing fingers of blame at him. I am sure they were probably saying, "It's your fault. If you hadn't taken us away from our families, then this never would have happened." How did David respond to all of this? Verse 6 tells us that "David found strength in the Lord his God." The rest of the story tells us that David and his men pursued the Amalekites and rescued their families. It was a happy ending to a sad story.

But I believe that happy ending started with David's attitude at the peak of the crisis. In our present crisis we can feel sorry for ourselves; we can point fingers of blame at governments, hoarders, researchers, medical professionals, and lots of others. But what I really need to do is the same as what David did. Help me, O God to find strength in you during these hard times!
